San José Obrero Parish Church

Small in size and built in 1902, this chapel was championed by St Manuel Gonzalez Garcia as a place for spiritual solace in the Matadero el Polvorín area within the borders of the St Peter parish.

The style is eclectic yet there are Gothic traces on the main door. With a single nave, it is built in brick with a gable roof.

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


The British Cemetery
